Art attack

The London art world goes into overdrive next week as collectors and fans descend for the 13th Frieze bonanza. **Ben Luke** presents a guide to the best shows around town, plus the fairs and their wares

BYOND the heady excitement of the main fairs in Regent's Park, Frieze week has become an informal festival of visual culture – from the edgier galleries in the east and south, to the blue-chip spaces of Mayfair. The museums reserve their biggest shows for the Frieze week slot, the non-profits bring us the future stars, and the commercial galleries present shows that act as magnets for millionaire collectors. There's no better time to see for yourself how our city has become the global centre of art.

The fairs

Frieze London and Frieze Masters

Regent's Park, NW1. Frieze London, Weds to Oct 17; Frieze Masters, Weds to Oct 18. The catalysts for this whole shebang. Frieze London is the contemporary fair, with top galleries from around the world, a sculpture park and new commissions. Masters is dedicated to art from the ancient world to 2000 – this year, expect works from artists such as Lichtenstein and Auerbach. friezeartfair.com

Sunday Art Fair

Ambika P3, W1. Weds until Oct 18. Now six years old, Sunday is the fringier fair next to the blue-chip Frieze, with emerging international galleries and artists. Affordable art

I-54 Contemporary African Art Fair

Somerset House, Thurs until Oct 18. After three years, I-54 keeps growing – this year, 38 galleries dealing in African art are showing in Somerset House, presenting more than 150 African diasporan artists. i-54.com

Multiplied

Christie's, SW7, Oct 16-18. Multiplied is exclusively dedicated to artists' editions. Of all the fairs this is the one where you're most likely to find something affordable. multipliedartfair.com

PAD London

Berkeley Square, W1. Weds until Oct 18. Art is never created in a vacuum and PAD is where it overlaps with design. With 62 different galleries from across the world you'll find furniture and design objects with a fine art influence. pad-fairs.com

Prem Sahib: End Up

Southard Road, W1, until Nov 14. As his excellent show at the ICA continues, another exhibition for this prolific young British artist. The façade of the gallery is boarded up with a fading neon installation on top

Chisenhale Gallery, E3, until Nov 22. Manna's 70-minute film revisits a series of radio programmes recorded in Palestine in the 1930s by the German-Jewish ethnomusicologist Robert Lachmann. The piece follows in his footsteps in today's more fractured Middle East. chisenhale.org.uk

Kemang Wa Lebulere: Sincerely Yours

Gasworks, SW8, until Nov 8. This much-loved art institution in Vauxhall reopens after restoration with a show by this young South African artist. The installation explores the ways in which South Africa's history haunts its present. gasworks.org.uk

Rachel Rose: Palisades

Serpentine Sackler Gallery, W2, until Nov 8. Accompanying her work for the projects section of the Frieze London fair, Rose's first UK solo show is excellent: two enthralling and poetic videos fuse her



own footage with found materials, together with a sound work echoing around the Serpentine's walls. serpentinegalleries.org

Jon Rafman: Annual Commission

Zabludowicz Collection, NW5, until Dec 20. The first big UK show for the Canadian artist best known for 9-eyes.com, has work made from Google Street View's outtakes. Here, Rafman creates an immersive installation inspired by gaming imagery. zabludowiczcollection.com

Eddie Peake: Forever Loop

Barbican Art Gallery, EC2, until Jan 10. The Barbican's tricky Curve gallery hosts an ambitious installation by this provocative young artist. Includes video, dance and, as is customary for Peake, some nudity. barbican.org.uk

Studio Voltaire, SW4, until Dec 6. The UK debut for this Venezuelan artist who has been working to transform Studio Voltaire's galleries into a Caribbean-style school. There will be talks and workshops around themes of migration and globalisation. studiovoltaire.org
